GREETINGS FROM YOUR CHURCH COUNCIL

Since our last report your Church Council is working on the following:

Our Vice-Chair of Council, Laurie Duncan, attended a workshop on the United Church

of Canada's Violence and Harassment Policy earlier this year. He and I are working on the available resources to create a comprehensive paper to summarize the lengthy policy for ease of use. A full copy of the policy is located in the Church Office.

Work continues on the input of membership data into the software program, Churchwatch, and we have been advised that the task of digitizing the historical roll is near completion. We look forward to hearing of the uses of the data from Chris Dickson, of the Christian Community Team, at a future meeting.

The Council has fixed dates for upcoming Council meetings in 2015. The Annual Congregational Meeting is set for Sunday, February 15, 2015. Reports are due on or before Monday, January 5, 2015 at the Church Office.

Our ongoing challenge is meeting the budget and our Treasurer submitted a draft budget for 2015 at the November meeting. At the January meeting, the Council will approve a final budget for presentation to the congregation at the Annual Congregational Meeting. Our Treasurer has challenged the Council to consider sponsoring a fundraiser in 2015. More on this challenge in the new year.

To rebuild Trinity's "Funds in Trust" to meet future needs of the Church, the Board of Trustees are working on a Legacy Giving Program which "will be helpful in effectively promoting and encouraging members and adherents to remember Trinity in their estate planning decisions".

This report will be included in your 2015 Annual Report package

At this time of year, the Nominating Committee consisting of Marguerite Cameron and myself sit down to look at the vacancies on the various teams including those created by

completion of their term in accordance with the Policies and Procedure Manual. If you have time, talent and/or desire to serve Trinity United Church on any of our teams in 2015, we invite you to speak with one of us.

I recently attended a Ministry and Personnel Workshop. This was held in our Four Rivers Presbytery at Elgin United and facilitated by Bay of Quinte Conference staff Mary Jane Hobden, M & P Chair, Heather Morrison, attended a similar workshop last year. She and I will be discussing necessary changes to the Policies and Procedure Manual in order to come into compliance with the United Church of Canada Manual, our ultimate authority.

Finally, on behalf of your Church Council I extend all best wishes and blessings for the coming Christmas season.

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Members of the Board of Trustees pass along their best wishes for a safe and Merry Christmas to all members of the congregation.

As of November 25, 2014 Funds in Trust has a positive Bank Balance of \$180,034.00. Since the last Communicator report, there have been two (2) expenses totaling \$755.00 covered by Trust Funds for Christian Education: (a) Two Affirm Events held at Trinity and (b) sending three Trinity youths to the United Church Fall Youth Rally in Carleton Place

Trustees have decided to engage the services of the investment Brokerage Firm (Nesbitt-Burns in Perth) to assist and guide us in executing our investment mandate. Church Council was informed of this plan at the November 25, 2014 meeting. We hope to have the details of this initiative finalized before the end of 2014

Work continues on updating the Legacy (Planned) Giving Program. Church Council endorsed the vision for the revitalized "Program" for Trinity at its meeting November 25, 2014. The plan is to have the governance and operating procedures approved at the January 25, 2015 meeting of Council. We hope to have details and resources of the Program ready for presentation at the 2015 Annual Congregational Meeting in February.

As the end of 2014 approaches, please keep Trinity's "Funds Held in Trust" in your mind if you are considering your year-end charitable donations for 2014. While "Bequests" are the most common type of legacy gift, there are many types of planned gifts that you can consider. We are always looking for people to join us as friendly visitors. Maybe you already visit, please consider letting us know who you visit regularly. We would like to ensure all those who require a visit receive one. Men are always welcome to be visitors.

This season, take a stroll through Victoria Park to enjoy the Christmas displays. We would like to thank everyone involved with this project for Trinity United Church, especially Earl Weir, Bud Fawcett and Millie O'Neal.

For people who would like to attend church but have no transportation, we have a solution. Access Taxi will pick up people at the retirement/nursing centres and at individual homes. Cal Pipil, what a great story! Cal Pipil is a Baptist youth initiative in San Salvador, El Salvador. The parent church is a congregation which I served in the 1980s, and it is a vital connection for the United Church of Canada in Central America. In the midst of a wealth of great projects, they have recently embarked on a passionate mission to address youth issues in their local community. Gang violence, joblessness, poverty and political corruption are enormous issues which directly impact the young people of San Salvador. Cal Pipil is a small, vital youth ministry attempting to create positive opportunities for youth in this setting. A number of people from Bay of Quinte have visited Cal Pipil; from our own congregation - Cynthia Sirrett, Maude Woods and myself.

Over the past month, we have engaged in a fundraising effort to support this impressive grassroots ministry. I am so pleased to say that to date we have raised \$1350 for Cal Pipil, and that number continues to grow. It is a worthy project with great oversight from Emanuel Baptist Church. I am so impressed that we have seen fit to support it so substantially. Other congregations in our Conference are also raising Cal Pipil funds, and I look forward to sharing with a Conference total in the New Year. MEMBERSHIP & WELCOMING

Churchwatch will also remind us when baptized children will be of confirmation age, who has a birthday etc. Churchwatch has a hymn book, a bible and many other features online that are currently not being used.

Once this information is all updated, the Church will benefit in many ways. We will clearly know who is a member so when the church is required to submit money for each member to Presbytery, we will be paying the correct amount. We will not be paying for those who are no longer members, those who want to remain members but no longer live here, those who have transferred etc. We will also have the information regarding the areas mentioned above.

REPORT FROM AFFIRM

The Bay of Quinte Conference of the United Church of Canada voted to become an Affirming Ministry of the United Church at the Conference Annual Meeting in 2013. The youth from Conference last year asked us why we weren't an Affirming Ministry. We listened and at the last congregational meeting we voted overwhelmingly in favour of entering a time of education and discernment to explore what being an Affirming Ministry within the United Church of Canada means. in general, and what that might mean for us. A notice was put in the bulletin, and an Ad Hoc group was formed. We serve as part of this congregation to provide educational and discernment opportunities so that we may understand all the issues under the Affirming Ministries umbrella. Some of the topics under that umbrella deal with race, gender, ageism, ability, and specifically sexual orientation meaning gay, lesbian, bi-sexual, transgender. That is all we have agreed to as a congregation. We will move forward gently with a variety of opportunities.

The group will continue to provide opportunities for education and discernment such as our speaker series with the Rev. Dr. George Hermanson and our bible study using Lectio Divina. We will continue to put announcements in the bulletin that fall under the Affirm umbrella and have written resources available for you. If there is any other material you would like to explore, please get in touch with any member of the group: Chris Dickson, Barb Ellis, Sue Newport, Linda & Ron Stronski. We will be hosting a pot-luck

lunch on Sunday, Jan. 18, 2015 followed by a short DVD and time for discussion and friendship.

We have this opportunity, and we shouldn't let our uncertainty and our fears paralyze and divide us. Remember the words Jesus said, "I will not abandon you, my love is greater than your fear," those words will help us move forward as Christians living in the 21st century to love God with all of our hearts, minds and souls and to love our neighbours as ourselves.
